Prayer by Father Peter Wilson, Catholic University Chaplaincy

As we gather for this memorial event, we bring together 3 things in our prayers: a remembrance of those who died, a cry of despair and bewilderment at the capacity of human beings to do evil and an affirmation of belief and hope in the goodness which always shines through even the darkest of deeds. As the holocaust survivor Viktor Frankl wrote: "After all, man is that being who has invented the gas-chambers of Auschwitz – but he is also the being who has entered those gas-chambers upright, and with the Lord's Prayer or the Shema Y'Israel on his lips".

We begin firstly, and most importantly, by remembering those who have died, and each of us, according to our religious tradition, in silence offering our prayer or remembrance.

Lord God, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We entrust humanity in its great goodness and also its folly to the mercy and guidance of God, and we ask that out of the evil of this tragedy, the tales of good deeds and the commitment to do good will always flourish and triumph.

We use Psalm 130 to sum up our prayers

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord, Lord, hear my voice!
O let your ears be attentive to the voice of my pleading.

If you, O Lord, should mark our guilt, Lord, who would survive?
But with you is found forgiveness: for this we revere you.


My soul is waiting for the Lord.

And we rejoice in the ability that You have given us – even after the deepest tragedy – to rebuild, to create new life, to find hope and light by connecting with our brothers and our sisters and with You, God, to Whom be all honour and glory now and unto the ages of ages.
